Perek Yomi Study Group: Reading the Bible from Start to Finish

Ongoing, meets monthly

Thursdays 8pm at Temple Emunah

Temple Emunah's *Perek Yomi* (daily chapter) study group meets on a regular basis to read and discuss the Bible. This group meets once a month at 8 pm in the Temple Emunah Library. Usually the group meets on the first Thursday of the month but it varies from month to month.

The original *Perek Yomi* concept, promoted by the Conservative movement, was to read one chapter a day, eventually covering the entire Hebrew Bible. Our group has modified this approach since 30 chapters are too much to discuss in one meeting. It is instead proceeding at a more leisurely pace of about 12 chapters per month.

The point of this program is to read material that goes beyond what is read in the synagogue, to do this in consecutive fashion (as opposed to, say, the *haftarot*), and to discuss it with peers (not experts). Participants use different translations and bring in material from a variety of sources as well as their own ideas, which leads to very insightful discussions.

Dr. Alexander Kaye is a faculty member at Shalom Hartman Institute of North America. He is the Karl, Harry, and Helen Stoll Assistant Professor of Israel Studies, and Assistant Professor in the Department of Near East and Judaic Studies at Brandeis University. He received a Ph.D. in Jewish history from Columbia University, and a B.A. and M.Phil. from the University of Cambridge. He is ordained as a rabbi, having received his rabbinical ordination from Yeshivat Chovevei Torah Rabbinical School, and served as Assistant Rabbi of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun in New York. Previously he taught at Princeton University and The Ohio State University.

Dr. Kaye's research is on Jewish intellectual history and the history of political and legal thought. With David N. Myers, he co-edited <u>The Faith of Fallen Jews</u>, a collection of works by the late Prof. Yosef H. Yerushalmi. His new book, <u>The Invention of Jewish Theocracy</u>, forthcoming from Oxford University Press, is a history of the idea, espoused by many religious Zionists, that the State of Israel should be run by halakha.

He was selected as an inaugural AVI CHAI Fellow, and is the author of Empowered Judaism: What Independent Minyanim Can Teach Us About Building Vibrant Jewish Communities (Jewish Lights,



Five unusual biblical books—Ruth, Esther, the Song of Songs, Lamentations, and Ecclesiastes—have a unique role in Jewish life: each provides a liturgy for a festival in the cycle of the year. Beyond that, each of these books is delightfully idiosyncratic compared to the rest of the Bible. We will discover together just what makes these books so special, through a close reading of the primary texts as well as secondary literature that puts them in the context of Israel's experience in the ancient Near East.



Rabbi Neal Gold is currently the Jewish Chaplain and Hillel Director at Babson College, and recently received a second M.A. in Near Eastern & Jewish Studies from Brandeis University. He has served as the national Director of Program & Content for ARZA, the Association of Reform Zionists of America, where he continues to work on Special Projects. For over 18 years he served congregations in New Jersey and Massachusetts. He received smicha from Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in 1997 and graduated Colgate University with a B.A. in Philosophy and Religion. His writings on Judaism and Israel have appeared in a variety of academic and popular books and journals. He is the editor of Radiance: The Collected Prose and Poetry of Danny Siegel, which will be published this winter by the Jewish

Publication Society. He especially loves Tanakh, Talmud, Midrash, early Chasidic spirituality, the roots of Zionism, and points of connection and departure between different faith traditions. He has also led a wide variety of off-the-beaten path, adventurous trips to Israel for adults, teens, and families. He has served on the faculty of the URJ Adult Summer Learning Institute (Kallah) and NFTY's Leadership Summits. He is married to Heidi Gold and they have two sons, Avi and Jeremy. Fall 2019 Me'ah Select Thursdays: The Creation of the Modern Jew: European Nationalism, Zionism, and American Jewish Life.

The advent of the Enlightenment in Europe led to legal emancipation that freed Jews from their centuries-long separate existence. As nationalism led to the establishment of culturally distinct nation-states, Jews found themselves "officially" invited to become citizens. But this new legal status did not by itself alter the religious and cultural otherness of the Jews. The Jews' new status was challenging and often entailed adverse and even tragic consequences. How did Jews -- and some non-Jews -- respond to this situation?

In this course we will begin with the background of nineteenth and twentieth century nationalism, and will then focus on to the two most important responses to this challenging situation: Zionism and the creation of American Jewish life. Both endeavored to make it possible for Jews to fit into a society and to call it "home." Modern Jewish life is a direct consequence of these two responses.



Jacob Meskin, PhD., both teaches in and trains faculty for Hebrew College's Jewish adult-learning program, Me'ah, and is one of the co-authors of the curriculum for Parenting Through A Jewish Lens, in which he also teaches. In addition, he works as a consultant on adult Jewish education and teacher training in the Boston area. Prior to joining Hebrew College, Meskin was the inaugural holder of the Ruderman Chair in Jewish Studies at Northeastern University and taught at Princeton University, Rutgers University, the Bernard Revel Graduate School of Yeshiva University, Williams College and Lehigh University. His articles have appeared in Modern Judaism, The Journal of Religion, Soundings,

Levinas Studies, Judaism, Cross Currents and in several edited volumes.

In this course, we will study core values and ideas in each of these domains, and seek to establish for ourselves fundamental literacy in foundational Jewish values and core ideas.

Samuels is a doctoral candidate in science, philosophy and religion at Boston University. He serves on the faculty of Me'ah and Ma'ayan and is a Genesis scholar at Combined Jewish Philanthropies.

Winter/Spring Me'ah Select 2020 Thursdays: The Sacred and the Profane: Creating Modernity and the Modern Jew

with Rabbi Leonard Gordon

Beginning with Spinoza and concluding with contemporary Jewish feminists our class will consider how secular and religious Jews shaped modern Judaism and modernism itself. Often pairing religious and secular figures who were contemporary we will look at the enlightenment (Spinoza and Mendelson), messianism (Marx and Scholem), Zionism (Herzl and Ahad Haam), morality (Freud and Salanter), Hassidism and Halakhah (Buber and Rosenzweig), Israel and the American Diaspora (Roth, Bialik, Rachel and Amichai), Feminism (Plaskow, Piercy, Falk and Lefkovitz on liturgy, bible and the canon).



Rabbi Leonard Gordon is co-Director, along with the Rev. Dr. Peter Pettit, of Interfaith Partners for Peace, a project of the Jewish Federations of North America and the Jewish Council for Public Affairs. At the JCPA, he co-chairs the task force on Jewish-Muslim relations. Previously, he served as the chair of Interfaith Relations. In that capacity, he has travelled to Israel with delegations of Evangelical thought leaders, Episcopalian and Muslim leaders, and with Interfaith Partners for Peace. With rabbinic ordination from the Jewish Theological Seminary, he has a BA and M Phil from Columbia University, and an MA in Religious Studies from Brown University. In 2018, he earned a Doctor of

Ministry degree at the Andover Newton Theological School with a thesis entitled, "Building Interfaith Relationships to Promote Peace."

Rabbi Gordon has taught comparative religion and Humanities at Columbia University, Kenyon College, and the Ohio State University; and he has taught rabbinic literature, history, philosophy, and liturgy at the Jewish Theological Seminary, the Hebrew College Rabbinical School, and the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College. He began teaching for Me'ah in 2018. Among his publications, he was an editor of Mahzor Lev Shalem and is author of the forthcoming article, "A Jew Reads Sura Al Fatiha."
